Year 1

Wow! What a term it has been for Year 1! It has been packed full of learning, singing, trips and lots of fun!

In English this term, we have been looking at features of persuasive writing and have been using these skills to try and convince an audience to buy some pumpkin pancakes that we made in an awesome cooking lesson, and also to buy the queen's knickers! We then moved onto instructional writing, where the children have been very bossy by using imperative verbs in their sentences.

In maths we have been focusing on addition and subtraction and the children have shown true resilience in this, using new skills of number lines and tens frames to add and subtract numbers within 10. We are now finishing off the term learning how we can sort 2D and 3D shapes into groups and patterns.

Our history topic this term was 'Kings and Queens' and we have been learning about lots of famous monarchs, such as King Charles III, Queen Elizabeth I and Queen Victoria. We started the term off by visiting the Queen's house in Greenwich, where we looked at lots of fascinating paintings and even drew our own portrait of a queen. We have also been to visit our local church to support our topic of 'Christianity' in RE, where the children went on a hunt for wooly sheep around the church and then found out more about the nativity and why Christians use a holy book.

Thank you to all parents and carers for your continued support by helping the children with their homework and reading to them daily. We can already see fantastic progress in their phonics and their writing skills and these will continue to build with further home practice. We have also been encouraging the children to use numbots at home, which will help support their number fluency in addition and subtraction.









Year 2

Term 2 has come to an end and Year 2 have had a busy one! We have immersed ourselves in all things Great Fire of London, had some fantastic cooking sessions, and have become masters on stage with our much awaited Nativity performance. We went on a fantastic trip for R.E to get in the spirit of Christmas and learn more about the story of the Nativity. In science we have been learning all about plants. We even grew our own peas to observe the stages of the life cycle and how seeds germinate. We have had lots of fun observing the growth of our plants each morning!


This term in maths we have looked at addition and subtraction. We have developed fluency in our bonds to 10 and 100, adding 3 single digit numbers, adding and subtracting across tens, from tens and became pro's at using number lines. We have done lots of collaborative and work and have had lots of fun learning all things numbers.

In History we have stepped back in time to 1666, to the dreaded night on Pudding Lane that made history. We have linked our learning to DT where we have produced our own Tudor houses and will even have a go at burning them in the playground! In English we have written a newspaper report documenting the events of the fire as well as exploring lots of descriptive language to bring our writing alive.

From all of the team in Year 2, we wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.











What another busy term it has been for year 3! We have really enjoyed exploring the Stone Age this term through a wide range of exciting and engaging lessons and experiences. In Maths, we have covered addition and subtraction, using written formal methods, exchanging across 10s and 100s. We have started looking at multiplication and division, exploring the links between counting in 2s, 5s and 10s and the 2, 5 and 10 times tables.

In English, we have learnt about instructional writing and the structural and language features of this text type. This led us to writing a recipe for our dream sandwich. After, We looked at settings and how we can use expanded noun phrases and the past progressive to describe a scene from this time in the past.

In Design Technology, we have been designing and making trousers for the Stone Age character Ug who only has stone trousers! Our design brief was to make a pair of trousers which are soft and comfortable. We began by looking at existing products, analysed these and wrote our own design criteria for the trousers we wanted to design and make. We have had many great experiences this term cooking in the kitchen, cooking food that would have been eaten during the Stone Age. We also became hunter gathers by foraging food in our garden and then using these ingredients to cook with. Our trips began with a visit to the British Museum, making links between our Roman topic last term and this term's topic of Stone Age. Recently, we went to the Natural History Museum to consolidate our learning about rocks.











Year 4

The year continues to march on in full swing and the children have had a very busy term indeed! It started off with a very mysterious event.... Both the year 4 classrooms were completely tipped up-side-down during assembly! We couldn't believe what had happened! But a few clues left at the crime scene eluded to an evasive creature....



"What has happened?"

"How did the white boards get up there?"

In English, we learnt how to write a non-chronological report, focusing on the use of subordinate and main clauses, fronted adverbials and beginning to develop our knowledge of expanded noun phrases. We discovered our evasive creature was a dragon and so we wrote about the different types of dragons the Dragonologists have come across over the years.

This term we focused on our knowledge of the times tables, as well as begin to develop our reasoning abilities by applying the formal methods for subtraction and addition in different ways. The children continue to grow in confidence exploring numbers and patterns.

The Anglo-Saxons and Vikings

The Anglo-Saxons and Viking were the topic for the term and we started off with workshop to introduce the children to what it was like living as a Viking! During the term, the children learned many aspects concerning this time period from life styles to the ever changing boundaries of the British kingdoms. The children have thoroughly enjoyed themselves throughout, learning the history of British Isles following the abandonment of the Roman Empire.

In DT, we focused on the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings learning how Viking weavers became some of the most influential people in the old world as their cloth was highly prized from around the world. We learned how to create a loom, and then made tapestries to celebrate the victory over the Anglo-Saxons.

Finally, Year 4 enjoyed a trip to the British Museum to research the Sutton Hoo exhibition and the different artefacts dating back to the time of the Anglo-Saxons. Great fun was had and we look forward to our next trip next term.





Year 5

This term, Year 5 have been learning about the Ancient Egyptians. We know all about the gods such as Anubis, Osiris and Amun-Ra, describing their appearance and discussing their powers. Did you know there were over 2000 Egyptian gods? We learned about Egyptian beliefs of life after death, looking at the mummification process and the weighing of the heart ceremony. We went to the kitchen and performed this ceremony with a real animal's heart! Although we did not have a copy of the Book of the Dead, which is just as well as it was written on a scroll over 70 feet long! We visited the British Museum and got to see mummies, Canopic jars and Shabti dolls, which was an amazing experience. We have written non-chronological reports about the Ancient Egyptians in English, using our year 5 grammar.









Walk like an Egyptian!





In Science, we have been learning about the properties of materials, specifically how to mix and separate different materials. In the kitchen, we performed experiments separating iron from cornflakes and evaporating the water from salt-water. In our classrooms, we have been growing salt crystals after evaporating salt-water over a long period of time.




We hope you all have a wonderful break and manage some rest, relaxation and reading.



This term our topic has been World War 2. Children have been learning about the Blitz, rationing, women's roles, propaganda, evacuees, the Holocaust, D-Day and other key events in both Britain and Europe from 1939-1945. Inspired by their learning about the Blitz in particular, the children have created two pieces of writing this term: one narrative set during a bombing raid and a set of instructions for how to safely evacuate a cinema once an air raid siren sounds.

To support their learning, the children also enjoyed a trip to Chislehurst Caves, which played a key role in World War 2 as a sanctuary for citizens during the Blitz. Unfortunately, we weren't permitted to take any photos in the caves themselves, but the children had a fantastic time and gained a lot from the experience.

In science, the children have been learning about light: how it travels, how shadows are formed, how the eye works and how white light can be refracted to display all the colours of the visible spectrum.



Children have enjoyed several kitchen lessons this term, including as part of our DT project. Children have used their understanding of rationing to design war-themed recipes, including for the National Loaf.

In computing, children have continued to learn about codebreaking and ciphers (following on from their learning about Alan Turing and Bletchley Park in term 1), while in PSHE, children have been learning about celebrating difference. Children have learnt about different groups of people, thought about what makes each of them unique and learnt about how to recognise and tackle bullying behaviour when it occurs.



As well as all the Christmas activities, Year 6 also enjoyed peer reading with the Year 3s this term. The children were very patient and supportive, helping the younger children to decode words and read with fluency and understanding.



After what has been a very fun but also very busy and long half-term, we hope you have a very relaxing and enjoyable Christmas holiday. We look forward to seeing you all again in the new year.




In Key Stage 1, children have visited the Queen's House for a Kings and Queens workshop and had a right royal time. They have also visited local churches.
