Wellbeing Update

I wanted to update you all on some of the work we have done around wellbeing this term and WOW what a term it has been!!

In response to staff and parent surveys, pupil voice and general feedback we received earlier in the year, our aim this term has been to break down the barriers and the stigma that often surrounds mental health, whereby seeking help is seen as a weakness/something we shouldn't do. How have we tried to tackle this?

Mental Health poster competition:

We had a staggering amount of entries into the mental health poster competition. A huge thank you to all the children who took part and to the parents in supporting them with this. As you will see below, the standard was amazing and it was incredibly hard to choose the winners. The posters are now up on display around the school for the children to see every day.





Mental Health Champions:

30 children from years 3, 4 & 5 have been trained as mental health champions. The workshop gave the children an awareness of mental health and strategies for dealing with different emotions as well as how to recognise signs in others when things are not okay. The children learned the importance of listening, supporting each other and how to have a healthy mindset.



Wellbeing Coffee morning:

It was great to see some of you at the Wellbeing coffee morning on Friday. The school counselor provided the parents with information about her role within the school, how referrals are and can be made and how counselling is conducted. Many of you commented on its success and we are hoping to run more of these in the future, so those who were unable to attend on this occasion will hopefully be able to join us next time. If you were unable to attend but perhaps the time of the day wasn't suitable, or perhaps there were other barriers that we could help with, please let us know and we will do our best to accommodate



wherever possible for future events. Some parents have suggested that they would like the next event to be based around supporting good routines (sleep, meal times etc) at home and therefore that is likely to be our topic at the next coffee morning.





Junior Citizenship Training:

We recognize that some of our year 6 pupils may be feeling anxious about moving onto their secondary schools in September. For many, the journeys to and from school will be a lot further and may also involve the use of public transport and greater independence. In partnership with TFL (Transport for London) we provided year 6 with an interactive workshop which would support their transition to travelling on public transport and/or with greater independence safely.

Reception

Well, the year draws to a close and the curtain falls - what a show it's been, we'll hold for the applause....

This term, we've been learning about 'The Natural World' and all the beautiful parts of our big watery orb that sits and spins within a big galaxy of stars and, most importantly, all the amazing creatures that call it home. We got snuggly in the sensory room and discovered what animals really do get up to while we snooze. We've had some feathery visitors from the farm, climbed the tallest vines and found out what lives in the wildest of jungles, meeting caterpillars, spiders, stick insects, butterflies, frogs and more. We've even swam to the deepest parts of the ocean and explored what really does live in the deepest and darkest depths of our seas. We even ate with some sharks when we visited the London Aquarium and even recreated it at school! We got our magnifying glasses out in the garden and investigated the smallest of insects and what makes them just as special and unique as all the rest.

Despite all this, we discovered that one of the most important animals that live on earth are much closer than we ever realised: It's us! We've learnt that it's down to us to make sure that we all do our bit to keep our beautiful planet ticking along, just the way it was meant to. Lastly, we all think here in EYFS, as the year draws to a close, that insects really do say it best - the most amazing changes are still yet to come...











Year 1

Our learning experiences this term have been enjoyable and challenging! In Term 6 Year 1 were very busy learning about and exploring the natural world around us! In our English lessons, children met naughty Gnome, who was messing our garden. They used their reading skills to read the Gnome letters. Children learnt about explanatory text features and how to write them using these features: questions title, information in logical order. Children used their writing skills and produced many 'How to…' pieces of work helping the Gnome to be better in looking after our garden. They visited our garden and had a closer look at garden plants. We had a cooking lesson using seasonal foods to make tasty jelly and cheese flaps.

In Maths children were learning about the directions and positions. Children use the language 'full', 'half', 'quarter' and 'threequarter' to describe turns made by shapes/objects. The children solved mathematical problems and explored the educational world with hands on opportunities to count money, they were introduced to the hundred square and use it to count forwards and backwards within 100 to find halves and quarters. They worked very hard to solve reasoning problems finding the correct solution.

This half term in Geography lessons our focus has been The United Kingdom's weather. The children were introduced to simple weather forecast reading skills. Children were excited to pretend to be News presenter and forecast the weather. They learnt about The United Kingdom weather observing our daily weather, watching videos of extreme weather and having lots of discussions about it.

Year 1 had the topic of 'Judaism in RE. Children found out about the Synagogue and Shabbat and other significant Judaism features.

Our DT lessons were the most enjoyable for the children. They used IPad to research, then designed and made vehicles!

Children quotes about their learning:

Lily - Mae: 'I liked the animals, they are nice. I have a pet dog.' (Science – animals) Beatrice: 'I like poisonous frogs. They are very interesting. I used Ipad to research it.' (Science – animals)

Rei: 'I draw a picture, that is Japanese boat. They are for travelling and attacking other countries and for sailing.' (Culture day)







Year 2

This term, Year 2 has been exploring the wonderful adventures of the Hodgeheg by Dick King-Smith. We recreated scenes through drama, used expanded noun-phrases to describe the dangerous roads our hero Max found and created dialogues with correct punctuation.

In Maths, we made fantastic use of the garden to measure and explore volume and capacity, and now all your children will be able to tell you the time.

In Science, we consolidated this year's learning by exploring micro habitats, discussed what plants need to grow and explored materials by making and floating our own boats. From night time scenes in Art to learning more about what similarities our children's faith have, we have finished the school year on a high!







Year 3

This term the year 3 classes have been focusing on being green.

We read the stories of Michael Recycle and Varmints. With Michael Recycle we discussed the importance of recycling our rubbish, rather than putting it all in a landfill. We used this knowledge to write letters to the character of Litterbug Doug to convince him that he should recycle. In reading Varmints we looked at the impact that industrialization has on nature. We used the descriptive words and pictures to help us write free verse poems about our own human impact on nature.

We've also done a lot of other fun things. We cooked challah bread as part of our RE topic on Judaism. We found ways to use up all our food in making crisps out of potato skins, ketchup out of nearly overripe tomatoes and banana muffins out of over ripe bananas. One of our most favourite weeks was ICT week where we used google, power point and even did some coding.











Year 4

This has been a very busy term for Year 4. Our topic has been term! This term has been one of our favourite terms this year and the children have thoroughly enjoyed diving into the world of Ancient Egypt. There has been so much going on it is almost difficult to know where to start!

Focusing on Howard Carter's discovery of the Pharaoh Tutankhamun's tomb, the children have written some fantastic News Reports, detailing the ancient treasures that were unearthed by Howard and his team back on November 24th, 1922. The children were amazed to learn about the valley of the Kings, the mummification process and embalming. Following this, the children experienced what is was like for the embalming priests when they entered Chef Joe's kitchen and embalmed a fish ready for mummification; the result was certainly one experience the children will never forget!

Their journey continued in History, learning how the ancient Egyptians lived and the difference between the rich and poor. In Art, the children learned the many rules that governed Egyptian artists at the time, learning how to write their names in hieroglyphs and creating their own murals based on Ancient Egyptian lore and symbols.

There have been many fantastic events this term from Sports Day to the Art Project Gallery where the children recreated Tutankhamun's tomb and displayed replicas of the golden death mask that was found to mounting the young pharaoh's mummy.

It has been a wonderful term and a great one to finish the year on!







Year 5

In term 5, we researched space exploration – a topic the class thoroughly enjoyed – and spent time in the kitchen learning about nutrition for astronauts and freeze-dried foods for longevity on the International space station. The children debated whether it is beneficial to continue exploring space and using animals as pioneer astronauts. Hopefully you tuned into 5S' class assembly to hear their balanced arguments on this subject. The children learned

how to lead and measure a variety of angles as well as translating shapes, seeing that maths can be functional and beautiful too. In RE, the children learned about Humanism, a new idea for many of them, comparing this to their own approaches to life. Street art became arguably the most popular art topic of the school year, with children replicating the oxides and art works of Banksy and Keith Haring.

We celebrated the Queen's platinum jubilee in style with the whole school with our red, white and blue day including a playground party. We have seen confidence flourish and year 5 skills honed as we get to the end of the school year. Well done, Year 5!











Year 6

The topic for Year 6 this half-term was "The Greatest Show".

Normally, the final term in Year 6 is focused on the end of year production, but it has been such an action-packed term that unfortunately there hasn't been the time for both classes to rehearse together. As a result, children are working towards performing a medley of songs from the musical *Grease*, as well as singing a collection of their own favourite pop songs which they've voted for.

Year 6 have spent 4 weeks of the final term doing swimming for the majority of the day (each class spent 2 weeks doing swimming). It was amazing to see how much the children's confidence in the water improved in such a short space of time, and we're incredibly proud of how much progress they have all made.

We were also very impressed with how well all of the Year 6 children competed in their final sports day at Charlton Manor, giving their all, persevering and supporting each other during their various races and activities.

do our best to prepare the children for the next stage of their education. We have had a visitor coming in weekly to discuss fears and worries, how to make friends, how to be organized, what to expect at secondary etc., and we have been discussing similar issues to be classes. If L came in to talk to the children about safe travel and how to get to their new schools, and all of the children have also now visited their secondary schools, which they all seem to be really positive about. We are making sure that we are on hand to discuss any worries or concerns that the children may have, but we feel very confident that they are ready to make the step up to secondary school.

Much of the final term has also been focused on transition activities and assemblies, as we

In class, we have been looking at the play *Macbeth* in English, as well as doing descriptive writing and looking at how to write an action narrative. In guided reading we have been looking at dystopia, while in maths we have been doing a combination of preparation for the Year 7 curriculum along with some more extended projects to help the children to understand personal finance, including salaries, tax, bills and all the other fun things that adults need to think about!

In PE, the children have been learning how to play cricket, developing their confidence with batting, bowling and fielding. They have learnt some key skills around teamwork and have developed their awareness, tactical thinking and coordination.

Finally, the children did really well in their SATs, and we couldn't be more proud of all the effort and hard work that they put in to get there. Now they can all enjoy the end of term activities that we've got planned, including the beach trip and the disco. They're more than earned it, and although we know they're ready to move on, we're going to miss them all a great deal when they go to their new schools in September. We wish them all the best.
